#### Pesach Tikvah's Training Institute Concludes Year with EFT Training

Pesach Tikvah's Training Institute concluded its exemplary year of trainings for therapists June 24-27. The final training was on Emotion Focused Therapy. EFT is an effective mode of couples therapy for treating any issues in a marriage.

The training was led by Debi Scimeca-Diaz, LMFT, LCADC. Debi is a certified EFT trainer, one of the few in the world, trained by the International Center for Excellence in EFT founded by Sue Johnson. Therapists who completed this EFT externship received certification in EFT from the ICEFFT.

Aharon Fink, Director of the 640 Family Center, deserves credit for initiating this training. He himself trained in EFT with Debi and pushed to make it an official Pesach Tikvah training. The training was organized and produced by Lea Scharf, Director of the Training Institute.

The workshop was experiential, meaning that each of the participants went through a transformational process focused on their own development, in which they examined their own blind spots and learned how to sit with a couple while using an attachment lens. Debi brought a Chassidishe couple with her to demonstrate the techniques on, which was extremely powerful. She did two sessions with the couple in front of the group. Aharon brought in 5 of the top EFT practitioners to serve as helpers in the training to help facilitate the most effective training.

Following this training, there is an ongoing EFT supervision process group with Aharon Fink. The participating therapists will continue to develop their skills working in this model.

The therapists had to commit to taking on couples as patients after they completed the training, which is allowing the clinics to accept more couples. The therapists' new EFT skills are also being applied to patients who the therapists were already seeing.

A great thanks goes out to Lea Scharf, who has done an incredible job of organizing

this year's trainings. The Training Institute is not just one-time trainings; each training is followed by months of specialized group supervision in the new techniques. Lea Scharf provided tremendous opportunities for our therapists' professional growth and the growth of the clinics via the Training Institute. We look forward to next year's trainings.

#### Pesach Tikvah Well Represented at Neshumas Conference

On July 18th, Pesach Tikvah sent several representatives to the Neshumas Conference. Our Executive Director Yerachmiel Stern, 926 Family Center Director Aaron Zev Herbstman, 640 Family Center Director Aharon Fink, veteran Pesach Tikvah therapist and clinical supervisor Berish Weinberger, and Board of Directors member Avi Mendlowitz represented the organization. It was a valuable day of חיזוק and community involvement.

The Neshumas Conference is an annual conference of Chassidishe/Heimishe mental health professionals. This year it was held at the Crowne Plaza Suffern-Mahwah (near Monsey). Hundreds of clinicians attended the full day program to learn from experts in the field and to network. Aharon Fink and Avi Mendlowitz were two of ten people featured as industry experts who were there to consult with and advise clinicians.

Pesach Tikvah had a strong presence at the event. In addition to sponsoring the coffee station, which lined the hallway of the conference area and featured Pesach Tikvah branding, and sending featured industry experts, Pesach Tikvah was a strong presence at the networking events. Many young clinicians expressed a desire to work for Pesach Tikvah while meeting our upper management.

Pesach Tikvah's strong presence at the conference showed how much we are there for the community. It was clear to everyone at the conference that Pesach Tikvah is a major player in the Chassidishe/Heimishe mental health field. Our upper management overwhelmingly received praise from other attendees of the conference for the exceptional work that Pesach Tikvah does.

# Focus On: Joe Bistricer, Crisis Manager





Each month, we feature an unsung hero of Pesach Tikvah – someone who contributes something indispensable to the organization. This month, we spoke with Joe Bistricer about his work.

### Q: What is your position at Pesach Tikvah?

**A:** I'm the Crisis Manager at the ICF and I'm also Pesach Tikvah's Facilities Manager and Special Projects Manager.

### Q: How long have you worked for Pesach Tikvah?

A: 33 years, since 1991.

#### Q: What do you do in your position?

**A:** There can be events that happen, mostly in the ICF, that can affect the client's safety. We investigate what happened. Then we write a report, and we submit it to the Office of People with Developmental Delays. We also may submit the report to the Justice Center. The reports explain what caused the event, or possibly that the event didn't occur in the case of a false allegation. If anything happened, we want to determine what corrective actions we can take.

I manage the monthly review meetings for Crisis Management. I schedule the meeting and send out notifications to program

directors and a psychiatrist. We review the incidents that occurred. We also must have quarterly meetings on OMH where we have a peer-presentation on issues that could affect client care.

As Facilities Manager, I manage the three sites in Williamsburg and two in Borough Park. We have to make sure that all the sites we operate are in compliance with the Labor Department regulations, the Office of Mental Health regulations, and the OPWDD regulations. I'm always available to hear what the issues are. I manage the handyman and his assistant. Additionally, I oversee the maintenance of the two ICF vehicles.

#### Q: You were recognized at the 40 Years Legacy event for audit preparedness. Can you tell me how you prepare for audits?

**A:** Auditors want to see incident report records, and they want to see that necessary actions were followed through on. Carefully keeping those records and making them available to auditors is part of my role.

## Q: What do you attribute your longevity at the organization to?

A: My ability to work with others. Also adapting to new roles.

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### Q: What do you like about working at Pesach Tikvah?

A: I appreciate the founder's vision. We're fulfilling his vision of providing mental health services to the Williamsburg community and the greater Chassidishe community, to individuals, to families, and to youth at risk. I enjoy working in a support capacity to fulfill that mission.

I also like the dedicated people who are committed to providing services to vulnerable people. One of the things this organization does is provide support services to families at risk, and I derive satisfaction from helping vulnerable people.

### Q: What are you looking forward to in the future at Pesach Tikvah?

A: Watching the agency expand. We are rebuilding the third floor and fourth floor of this building because we are running out of space. We are expanding, which means that this year we helped more people than we did last year. It's reflected in the need for more space and more personnel.

### From Shared Struggles to Shared Strengths: The Role of Peer Support

Peer support is a powerful and effective way to help individuals, especially young people, facing mental health challenges like anxiety and depression. This kind of support involves people who have lived through similar experiences offering help and guidance to those currently struggling, creating a unique and empathetic support system.

One of the key benefits of peer support is the sense of understanding and empathy it fosters. When someone who has navigated similar struggles listens and offers support, it feels genuine and relatable. This shared experience helps build trust and reduces feelings of isolation, as individuals realize they are not alone in their journey. Moreover, peer support is empowering. Seeing someone who has successfully managed his mental health challenges provides hope and motivation. Peer supporters

can offer the initial encouragement and information needed to take that first step toward seeking professional help.

Additionally, peer support is flexible and adaptable. Whether through one-on-one meetings or group sessions, it can reach people in various settings and formats. This adaptability makes it accessible to a broader range of individuals, regardless of their specific circumstances or location.

Peer support is an essential component of mental health care. Its ability to provide empathy, empowerment, and accessible support makes it highly effective. By fostering connections and offering hope, peer support helps individuals navigate their mental health challenges more effectively and contributes to building a stronger, more compassionate community. As Proverbs, written by King Solomon, reminds us: "Anxiety in the heart of a person causes dejection, but a good word will turn it into joy."
